	<p>Parents will be asked to declare this by electronically signing a declaration on Famly before they can attend</p> <p>Children can only attend Peekaboo childcare and no other setting -</p> <p>Parents/carers who drop off/pick up must be symptom and must wear a face covering at all times. Only 1 adult should collect at a time and only household members can collect or drop off or ONE other person from the family support bubble</p> <p>When out on trips staff will make sure all social distancing guidance is followed</p> <p>Parents and staff will wear face coverings when welcoming children in and seeing them out of nursery. Minimise contact between groups where possible	We are an open plan nursery and so we are one group altogether.		
Where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE)	<p>Parents will wear face covering when dropping off and collecting</p> <p>Staff will wear PPE when a child displays symptoms of COVID-19 and the child will be isolated with the adult in the Rock Pool room until the parent collected them within 30 minutes.</p> <p>Staff will wear face coverings when not with the children and when answering the door or interacting with other adults</p>	high risk high risk	low risk low risk

Engage with NHS Track and Trace and Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus COVID-19 amongst the setting community and Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice	<p>All staff must ensure they understand the NHS test and trace process and how to contact their local Public Health England health protection team. We must ensure that staff members and parents/carers understand that they will need to be ready and willing to:</p> <p>book a test if they are displaying symptoms. Staff and children must not come into the setting if they have symptoms, and must be sent home to self-isolate if they develop them in the setting. All children can be tested, including children under 5, but children under 11 will need to be helped by their parents if using a home testing kit</p> <p>provide details of anyone they have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or if asked by NHS test and trace</p> <p>self-isolate if they have been in close contact with someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19)</p> <p>Anyone who displays symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) can and should get a test. Tests can be booked online through the NHS website, or ordered by telephone via NHS 119 for those without access to internet. Essential workers, which includes anyone involved in education or childcare, have priority access to testing.</p> <p>Peekaboo should ask parents and staff to inform them immediately of the results of the test:</p> <p>if someone tests negative, and they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating. They could still have another virus, such as a cold or flu – in which case it is still best to avoid contact with other people until they are better. Other members of their household can also stop self-isolating.</p> <p>if someone tests positive, they should follow Stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection and must continue to self-isolate for at least 7 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to the setting only if they do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell or taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. The 7-day period starts</p>	high risk for all points	low risk for all
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	<p>from the day when they first became ill. If they still have a high temperature, they should keep self-isolating until their temperature returns to normal. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days.</p> <p>Settings must take swift action when they become aware that someone who has attended has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19). Settings should contact the local health protection team. This team will also contact settings directly if they become aware that someone who has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) attended the setting – as identified by NHS Test and Trace.</p>	
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	<p>The local health protection team will work with settings to carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who has been in close contact with the person during the period that they were infectious, and ensure they are asked to self-isolate.</p> <p>The health protection team will work with settings in this situation to guide them through the actions they need to take. Based on the advice from the health protection team, settings should send home those people who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive, advising them to self-isolate for 14 days since they were last in close contact with that person when they were infectious. Close contact means:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> direct close contacts - face to face contact with an infected individual for any length of time, within 1 metre, including being coughed on, a face to face conversation, or unprotected physical contact (skin to skin) proximity contacts - Extended close contact (within 1-2m for more than 15 minutes) with an infected individual travelling in a small vehicle, like a car, with an infected person <p>The health protection team will provide definitive advice on who must be sent home. To support them in doing so, we recommend settings keep a record of children and staff in specific groups/rooms (where applicable), and any close contact that takes places between children and staff in different groups/rooms. This should be a proportionate recording process. Settings do not need to ask staff to keep definitive records in a way that is overly burdensome.</p> <p>A template letter will be provided to settings, on the advice of the health protection team, to send to parents and staff if needed. Settings must not share the names or details of people with coronavirus (COVID-19) unless essential to protect others.</p> <p>Household members of those who are sent home do not need to self-isolate themselves unless the child or staff member who is self-isolating subsequently develops symptoms. If someone in a group that has been asked to self-isolate develops symptoms themselves within</p>	high risk to all points	low risk to all points
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their 10-day isolation period they should follow '[Stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus \(COVID-19\) infection](#)'. They should get a test, and:

if the test delivers a negative result, they must remain in isolation for the remainder of the 10-day isolation period. This is because they could still develop the coronavirus (COVID-19) within the remaining days

if the test result is positive, they should inform their setting immediately, and must isolate for at least 7 days from the onset of their symptoms (which could mean the self-isolation ends before or after the original 10-day isolation period). Their household should self-isolate for at least 10 days from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms, following '[Stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus \(COVID-19\) infection](#)'

Settings should not request evidence of negative test results or other medical evidence before admitting children or welcoming them back after a period of self-isolation.
